Dear Provider,

We are writing to extend an invitation to receive free continuing medication education on how to navigate the complexities of the opioid crisis.

While fatal overdoses have decreased in Pennsylvania from 2017 to 2018 by 18%, the prescription opioid and heroin epidemic continues to be the worst public health crisis we face in the Commonwealth. In 2018, 12 people in Pennsylvania died of a drug-related overdose each day.

In an effort to empower medical professionals to identify patients struggling with addictions, the Pennsylvania Department of Health (DOH) and Department of Drug and Alcohol Programs (DDAP) has created education and tools to promote evidence-based prescribing. Since 2018, Quality Insights has partnered with the DOH to provide more than 100 learning sessions across health systems, private practices and stakeholder organizations on topics including:
